Many church leaders use the Directory to help congregation members going overseas to connect with a church.

ICS has long been concerned for the spiritual welfare of those who speak English and find themselves far from home, or speak English as a foreign language. Through the Directory people of all ages have been helped to find a welcome in churches all over the world. The price? A mere £4.00 including postage. # **Highlights from the AGM**

**All Saints' AGM took place on Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> April in the Church Hall. It was well attended and we had an extremely positive time together. We celebrated what God has been doing among us over the past twelve months and looking to the year ahead and beyond. We also reviewed the important business of the Church's finances and elected members to the Chaplaincy Council.**

**The large majority of the reports were taken as read with the Warden's, Chaplain's and Treasurer's Report being presented. On behalf of the Wardens, Patrick reflected on Isaiah's call to "prepare the way of the Lord" saying that 2007 was again a year full of activity and challenges. He thanked the staff team, - especially Tim "for all his hard work and effort over the last 3 years" and prayed that he may seek out the opportunities that the Lord has for him."**

**He highlighted a number of the weekly events that form the backbone of our church life expressing his marvel "at the energy of Joyce Wailes, Sandra Darra and Ruth Livingstone-Wallace" and their work with Tuesday Break and the Monthly Lunches. He noted also how 2007 had been a year of transition with a significant number of valued members leaving.**

**Patrick ended by saying, "As wardens we are grateful to all who support and administer All Saints'. We remember the quote from Isaiah with which we began this report and thank the Lord for all he has done for us to prepare His way in Vevey and ask for his continued guidance as we move forward in 2008."**

**Following Clive's Report (reproduced below) Derek gave the financial report for the year. He noted that though we ended the year with a budget deficit our income was similar to the**

previous year. The transient nature of the Church had impacted the Planned Giving Scheme. He encouraged the Church to continue to support it. As he ended he showed a graphic depicting where the Chaplaincy needed to be financially if it was to keep moving ahead. In addition to the questions he fielded on the night, Derek offered to meet anyone individually if they wanted any further clarification.

# Chaplain's Report



*In this edition of Contact, Clive summarizes the Chaplain's Report which he gave at the AGM held on Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> April.*

Ephesians 3v20-21 records Paul's faith-filled far sightedness, looking down at the generations of the Church to come and praying that the Father would be glorified in each and every one.

*"Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power at work within us, to him be glory in the Church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever. Amen."*

It is a prayer offered with confidence as Paul rests in the truth that God's power, working in flawed and imperfect human beings, will result in more than we can measure or imagine. His prayer reminds me that our common goal at All Saints' is to glorify the Father in our generation and to build a Church in order that a future generation will glorify him too.

With that in mind I went on to address what for me are three key issues :

- ⌘ All Saints in three years time.
- ⌘ Staffing for future development.
- ⌘ Financing today for tomorrow.

Our growing congregation has meant that we needed (happily) to ask ourselves deeper questions beyond simply, "How do we accommodate everyone?" This has made the Chaplaincy Council and I review yet again, the directions our Church should be taking, - especially over the next three years. This is, in my experience, always a healthy option to be constantly considered!

In our discussions together throughout last year, it was clear that any future direction needed to understand most profoundly what the church building itself means to many of our family. The values we place on our sense of family and togetherness. And an appreciation that our resources (people, their time talents and good will) are not limitless.

As I considered our future personally, I wanted to make sure that All Saints' would be mission focused at its heart. By that I mean, that our Church will continue to be a place where people can find faith and grow in faith. In addition, I was impressed by the thought that any future vision needed to be sensitive to our heritage – our past, our building and all that is good about All Saints' right now in 2008.

With all this in mind over the next 6 to 9 months, I'd like to aim to establish our new service schedule and develop a Crèche and Sunday School at the 09h00 service as soon as possible. To this end, we hope to provide training for anyone wishing to take on the exciting task of discipling our 4-11 year olds.

During 2009 I would like to see a "Fresh Expression of Church" developing out of our congregational life. "Fresh Expression" is a phrase coined by the Bishops of the Church of England in their desire to see the Church provide an environment for people of no church background, to find faith. I believe that Vevey is ripe for such a development.

If our gentle yet continuous growth maintains its momentum, then by 2010 we may face a Church where at least one of the services is again reaching capacity. If this is the case then I would like to

see one of our congregations planting into an alternative venue in the greater Vevey area. This I believe would give us additional scope for reaching out and ministering to the English speaking community.

In all this it is essential that we maintain our sense of family which is such a significant dimension of our church life. I would hope to do this by our monthly united service, our small groups as well as shared ministries such as Men's Ministry, Marriage and Family Ministry.

In summary, this would be a way forward that anchors us to All Saints' but does not limit us to one particular building. It would be a way forward which I believe would allow us to keep the best of the past as well as allow us space to build for the future.

Bearing in mind this direction, I'd like to emphasize the continuing need for a second staff member. Now that we have moved on to two main morning services and the resources that these require, (as well as other ministries, including carrying on the work among our teens,) there is plenty of work for a second staff member to do.

Having said that, I wouldn't wish to appoint a staff member simply based upon our current needs but also in terms of our future potential growth. With the Church community it is true that you staff in the direction you want to move in and that, for us, would mean staffing for things as yet unseen.

If a second staff member is to become reality, it will mean facing the challenge of financing today in order to make tomorrow a possibility. With our current level of giving, a second staff member is not possible right now. *But in faith the Chaplaincy Council has agreed a budget for the next 12 months which includes such a step forward.*

In drawing the Chaplain's Report to a close, I want to say that it is a privilege for me to lead this Church and it will be a privilege to continue to lead this church forward. My prayer is that in three years time we will all look back and confidently profess that He truly is *"able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to His power at work within us."*

## ***Book reviews***

### ***Mocha With Max (reviewed by Vivian Carey)***

I can't imagine anyone *not* wanting to pick this book up and read it!

You basically only spend as much time to read it as it takes you to enjoy your morning cup of coffee, but invariably it 'stimulates' you to want to read more. By the time you are half way through the book, you want to read it all over again and take notes with your bible next to you. This gets you into the habit of wanting to read not only what Max will say next, but seeing how it relates to things you have gone through in the past, present and even some of your 'aspirations' (i.e.our future)

I'm sure once someone starts reading it, they will want to buy as many copies as possible to 'share' with all their friends and loved ones.

**A review of the same book (Mocha With Max) by Liz Andrews**

A fabulous and fairly simply written book divided into 11 sections. It includes many “coffee-related” illustrations and thought-provoking sayings and proverbs, life and fictional analogies as well as scripture quotes – mostly from Eugene H. Peterson’s The Message. It is written in simple layman’s terms translations.

The message from Max Lucado in the preface quotes him as “Praying that the book will lead to some satisfying moments of fellowship with the Father.” For me personally, there were very many of these; sometimes emotional, heart-wrenching, deep thinking, logical and honest quotes.

A very highly recommended easy read which can be picked up at any time for a quick couple of minutes “fix” of God – ideal if spirits and faith are in need of being lifted.

**You Are Special (reviewed by Liz Andrews)**

A beautifully illustrated and heartwarming children's story which follows the world of small wooden people called Wemmicks. It’s main characters are Punchinello, a Wemmick and the woodcarver who created him, Eli.

An important message is relayed therein that no matter what others may think, God adores each and every one of us just as we are and that to God We are all Very Special. The perfect book for bedtime (or anytime!) for children of any age.

**You Are Mine (reviewed by Liz Andrews)**

A follow up to “You Are Special” and again illustrated by Sergio Martinez, this tale once more brings us Punchinello, the little wooden Wemmick. This time he learns a difficult but vital lesson – it’s not what you have in life, but whose you are and who you belong to.

Highly recommended. My children particularly enjoyed the emotions that ran through this story.

The Library is available after the service on Sundays. There is a choice of books, cassettes and videos for both adults and children. It’s simple and easy to use. Just make your choices, note them in the blue folder and tick them off when you return them. Happy reading.
